National Black Nurses Association to Host Series at the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's 54th Annual Legislative Conference

Silver Spring, MD – September 22, 2025 — The National Black Nurses Association, Inc. (NBNA) will host its inaugural Nurses Series during the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's (CBCF) 54th Annual Legislative Conference (ALC 54) on Wednesday, September 24, 2025, at the Washington Convention Center.

The series will feature two thought-provoking sessions addressing urgent national health equity priorities:

From Side Eye to Self-Care: Making Mental Wellness the Norm

This session will explore how normalizing mental wellness creates a society where seeking help is a strength, not a stigma. Leading nurse experts will share strategies for individuals, workplaces, and institutions to prioritize emotional health just as seriously as physical health.

 Advancing Black Maternal Health: A Blueprint for Legislative Change in a Time of Uncertainty 3:00 PM – 4:00 PM Room 144A

This session will highlight the urgent need for legislative reform and systemic solutions to address the Black maternal health crisis. Speakers will outline policy strategies to ensure every birth is met with dignity, safety, and equity.

"NBNA is committed to ensuring that Black nurses have a strong presence at this year's CBCF meeting, advocating for policies that improve health outcomes for historically underserved communities," said Dr. Sheldon D. Fields, President of the National Black Nurses Association. "Through these sessions, we are amplifying the voices of nurses who are on the frontlines of care and policy change."

Each session offers 1.0 Continuing Education credit (CE) and will feature nationally recognized nurse leaders and health policy advocates.

The NBNA Series is part of ALC 54's theme, "Made for This Moment: Power, Policy, and Progress," which brings together thousands of thought leaders, policymakers, and advocates to discuss critical issues impacting Black communities.

Both educational sessions are open to all CBCF attendees. NBNA especially encourages its members, partners, other healthcare professionals, and the broader nursing community to attend these sessions.
